

BENEFITS FOR TRIO AT JAMAICA RACES

Red Cross, Trainer Fitzsimmons, and Jockey Walls Each Have Big Day at Track.

The Red Cross, Trainer James Fitzsimmons and Jockey George Walls were very much in the public eye at the Jamaica races yesterday. All the gate receipts were donated to the Red Cross, and the fund was further increased by the Nassau Stable turning back the purse won in the handicap by Decisive. Auctioneers were busy collecting money from the clubhouse patrons by the sale of horses, paintings and flowers, and even the jockeys took up a subscription for the reigning charity.

Fitzsimmons, who is now a public trainer, caused a sensation by saddling three of the six winners, these including the Red Cross Handicap and the Highland Selling Stakes, which were the day's features. All three of the horses sent to the post by Fitzsimmons were ridden by Jockey Walls, but each was the property of a different owner.

The Fitzsimmons influence began to be felt when little Walls, perched on the back of H. L. Pratt's Game Cock, guided his mount home in front of a field of selling platers in the second race at a mile and a sixteenth. Walls next had the mount on the Nassau Stable's Decisive in the event named for the Red Cross, and in which the distance was six furlongs. The chances of a second victory looked slim when Ed Cudihee and The Masquerader were making the pace, with Decisive among the trailers. Walls got busy, however, on hitting the stretch and Decisive came on with a rush to win by a length and a half from The Masquerader.

Compadre, owned by the Quincy Stable, was tightened up by Fitzsimmons for the Highland Stakes, also at six furlongs. The stable connections were not upset by his defeat on Wednesday and figured with some reason that the change in track conditions would favor the black son of Colin. The result justified the heavy speculation on Compadre, for Walls had his easiest ride of the day, taking the track early and winning by five lengths from Poacher.

Another notable stallion has been added to those in the possession of the United States, as F. Ambrose Clark, acting for the Government, bought Achievement, by Hastings-Achieve. Jules Garson bought the horse in the morning from Wilfred Viau, and later sold him for remount purposes.
