Had I not loaned Harry Hogle 11.00 when he left this would not have been necessary but as I have not heard from him I have to do it. He promised to send it to my right away but failed to. The first exam is just 12 days off and I will have to buy a couple more books very soon. Please don't think mother that I'm throwing money to the wind for in the last week I have spent very very little and you know after paying board and tuition I had little left. My cigarette bill for the past week has been less than 50 p. 50. My name is still on the waiting list for a position but to date nothing has turned up. Please answer special delivery

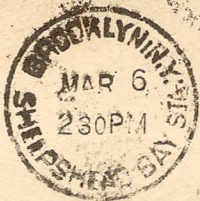
