Passing grade, 75 per cent.

Minimum Grade Required of College Students—A student whose grade in a course for any term is less than 50% shall be considered as making no real progress in the course and shall be dropped from the rolls of the class unless the professor recommends in writing to the Registrar, on the term report of the class, that the student be kept on the rolls of the class.

A student who through neglect of his work is evidently making no real progress in a course may at any time, after due admonition, be required by the professor concerned and the dean, to drop the course in question.

Any student who through enforcement of these regulations is left with only 12 session-hours, and who does not pass on 6 session-hours and average at least 60% on 6 session-hours of the remaining courses, for any ensuing term; and any student left with 9 session-hours, who does not pass on 6 session-hours and receive a grade of at least 65% on the 3 session-hours of his remaining course for any ensuing term, shall be dropped from the University.

Any student, other than a first-year student, who, through enforcement of these regulations is left with less than 9 session-hours shall be dropped from the University. A first-year student who, through enforcement of these regulations is left with less than 9 session-hours, shall be dropped from the University unless he shall have made a grade 75% on 3 session-hours, and at least 65% on the other 3 session-hours. But any student, who is permitted under this condition to remain in the University, shall be required to take up new courses sufficient to bring his session-hours up to 12, and shall be dropped from the University if in the next ensuing term he does not pass on 6 session-hours and average at least 60% on the remaining 6 session-hours.
